

OHIO NATIVE ANNUALS AND BIENNIALS

G. A. Christie (2 pp.)

- Bidens coronata* (tickseed sunflower) (Asteraceae) Annual OR Biennial.
Throughout Ohio.
- Campanula americana* (tall bellflower) (Campanulaceae) Biennial.
Throughout Ohio.
- Chamaecrista fasciculata* (partridge pea) (Fabaceae) Annual. Scattered.
- Collinsia verna* (blue-eyed Mary) (Schrophulariaceae) Annual. Southern and scattered. (Strikingly beautiful bi-colored flower, with blue lower lip and white upper lip.)
- Corydalis flavula* (yellow corydalis) (Fumariaceae) Annual. Scattered.
- Erigeron annuus* (daisy fleasbane) (Asteraceae) Annual. Throughout Ohio.
- Erigeron philadelphicus* (Philadelphia fleabane) (Asteraceae) Biennial.
Throughout Ohio.
- Erigeron strigosus* (white-top) (Asteraceae) Annual. Throughout Ohio.
- Gaura biennis* (gaura) (Onagraceae: evening primrose family) Biennial.
Throughout Ohio.
- Gentianella quinquefolia* (stiff gentian) (Gentianaceae) Annual OR Biennial.
Scattered. (Blooms Sept.-Oct. Needs moist soil.)
- Gentianopsis crinita* (fringed gentian) (Gentianeaceae) Annual. N. Oh. and scattered. (Last to bloom, Sept.-Oct. Bright blue tubular flowers with fringed petals.)
- Impatiens capensis* (spotted touch-me-not) (Balsiminaceae) Annual. Throughout Ohio (Seeds shoot on touch. Soothing sap.)
- Impatiens pallida* (pale touch-me-not) (Balsiminaceae) Annual. Mainly eastern Ohio. (Sap relieves burns. Hosts spicebush swallowtail butterfly, draws bumblebees, hummingbirds.)
- Lactuca foridana* (blue lettuce) (Asteraceae) Biennial. Mostly east and south in Ohio. 2-8'.
- Oenothera biennis* (evening primrose) (Onagraceae) Usually biennial.
- Phacelia purshii* (Miami mist) (Hydrophyllaceae) Annual. Throughout Ohio.
- Polygala sanguinea* (purple milkwort) (Polygalaceae) Annual. Eastern and southern Ohio. (Blooms June-Sept. Rose-purple flower.)
- Sabatia angularis* (rose gentian) (Gentianaceae) Biennial. Eastern and southern

Ohio (Fragrant. Very adaptable)

Triodanis perfoliata (Venus' looking glass) (Campanulaceae) Annual. Mostly east and south. (Sessile, heart-shaped leaves; small, lovely blue flowers with yellow centers.)
